Chapter 93 Annual Banquet Speaker Announced

EAA Publications Director, Mary Jones, to speak on February 7

Mary Jones is no stranger to EAA or to aviation. Here is an excerpt from a recent column that Mary wrote about her new position at EAA headquarters in Oshkosh.

It's been an exciting time because I've taken on the new role of *EAA Sport Aviation* editor and leader of the EAA publications staff following the departure of my friend, David Hipschman, who served in that role for the past two years. Any new role is also a challenge, but EAA's publications have been a part of my life for a long time, and that familiarity eases the challenge.

For those of you who don't know me, this is my 25th year as an EAA employee, all of it as a member of EAA's publications staff. I began as an editorial assistant, working on EAA's division publications with Gene Chase and Norm Petersen. Jack Cox was editor-in-chief of Sport Aviation, and I had the honor and privilege to begin learning about aviation from Jack, Gene, and Norm, three of the most knowledgeable men in the field at the time.

In 1985, I was named editor of *Ultralight and the Light Plane* magazine, which eventually became *Light Plane World* and then *Experimenter*. I was part of the

EAA team that promoted the sport pilot/light-sport aircraft initiative and developed *EAA Sport Pilot & Light-Sport Aircraft* magazine. And, I've written articles for EAA Sport Aviation many times over the years, covering the ultralight, homebuilt, and light-sport aircraft "beats."

Throughout all these years, the best benefit of working at EAA is the opportunity to meet wonderful people...members...from all over the world. I have friends throughout the United States, in France, Germany, the Netherlands, Spain, and Sri Lanka, for example, because of working at EAA.

I've flown and flown in many aircraft—weight-shift trikes, powered parachutes, a FlightStar, Kolb TwinStar, RANS S-6, a T-18, an RV-6A, a Stinson 108-3, a Cessna 150 and 152, a Comanche, to name a few, and, dare I gloat, Burt Rutan's Boomerang. I have about 20 hours of instruction, but as with many EAAers, raising two kids and life in general got in the way of earning my certificate...thus far. I've also helped build a powered parachute, a two-place FlightStar, an RV-6A, and a Sonex, and helped with a restoration project or two. Should I admit I enjoy rib stitching?

In other words, I've had 25 years of immersion in all that EAA is, and it's been fun, interesting, and educational. As Paul (Poberezny) would say, I've learned a lot about aircraft and people in the past 25 years, and I'm still learning.

Left to right: Waco YKS-7, Stinson SR-6A "Reliant", Fairchild 24. The tail of the plane in the foreground is also a Fairchild 24. The small windsock on the tail is a drogue for a retractable wire antenna that could be reeled out for transmitting and in landing. Note also all these aircraft are powered by five or seven cylinder radial engines; fuel was cheap in those days. The CAP emblem is the old wartime style. The later emblem had a three bladed propeller inside the triangle and the colors are red white and blue.
