

## BOOK REVIEW: "Jimmy Stewart Bomber Pilot" by Starr Smith, 2006, Zenith Press, 287 p. soft cover

This book covers the entire life of movie star Jimmy Stewart, from his birth May 20, 1908, to his death July 2, 1997, with special emphasis on his World War II service, first as a B-17 instructor and then as a B-24 pilot and commander with the 8th air force stationed in England.



While Stewart is the principal character of the book, the air war of World War II is covered pretty completely. While we think of him as a movie star, he thought of his military career as his primary occupation, from his commissioning as Second Lieutenant in the regular air force in 1942 to his retirement from the air force reserves as Brigadier General in 1959. He flew 20 combat missions, was awarded 5 medals, was beloved by the crews under him. There is a Jimmy Stewart Museum in his hometown of Indiana, Pennsylvania, covering both



his movie and military careers, and there is a bust of him in the Mighty Eighth Force Heritage Museum in Savannah, Georgia.

The book is a very interesting read while covering Jimmy Stewart. It bogs down a bit when it deviates to the air war in general.

The book I read was borrowed from Dave Van Lanen.
