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Book Review

"I Could Never be so Lucky Again," an autobiography by Gen. James H. "Jimmy" Doolittle, with Caroll V. Glines, 544 p. paperback, a Bantan Book.

The book begins and ends with the details of the "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo" mission led by him, in reality a very minor part of Doolittle's accomplishments. The book's title is very appropriate, not only for his twice membership in the "Caterpillar Club," but also for the multiple airplane accidents that he was in.

Over his lifetime he was a racing pilot, a stunt pilot, a test pilot, and a WWII fighting pilot. He was a family man – wife Joe, son Jimmy Jr., grandson Jimmy III.

As a businessman he was an advisor, director, and Chairman of the Board of multiple corporations. As a statesman, he was an advisor to Presidents. He knew the number of flying hours a month needed to keep proficient, and when his statesman and businessman duties cut into that, he stopped flying.

His education included a Bachelor of Arts from the University of California and a Master and Doctor of Science from MIT. He had eight honorary Doctor's Degrees.

Of the non-fiction books I've read, this is the best. I bought it in the wearhouse of Airventure Oshkosh 2012 with a coupon I won at our Chapter 93 work weekend.
