The Pietenpol in the Clubhouse

Some of our younger members have seen the airplane parts that get in the way so here is the history of the Pietenpol airplane and the "Blackhawk Fliers."

Back in 2006 Dick Hartwig sold the rough fuselage, tail feathers, ribs and some metal parts of a Pietenpol design to six of us for \$1,800 or \$300 each. We formed a building club meeting every second Thursday of the month for a couple of hours. Some of us also did some work at home or other days. Bill Rewey is our advisor. He's built two!

We decided to use the Riblett GA30U612 airfoil because it has more lift and better stall characteristics. We've been selling the old Piet airfoils at \$20 each. (I've got one of each on a wall at home.)

Jerry Matzelle was our president but left town and sold out. We bought an overhauled Continental 65 from Bill Rewey for \$5,000 or \$833 each. We've been paying dues of \$25 per month which would be around \$2,500.

The Piet cruises at around 75 miles an hour, is quite stable, easy to fly for someone who just want to get up in the air. We are interested in more members. For \$1,000 (even prorated) you could learn some building details and save \$2,400 or more (\$3,533 – 1,000).
