

Book Review



"The Mighty Eighth at War – U.S. 8th Air Force Bombers Versus the Luftwaffe 1943–1945" by Martin W. Bowman, 280 p. softbound, 2010, published by Pen and Sword Aviation.

This is an exciting accounting of individual bombing by U.S. "heavies" (B-17s and B-24s) escorted by fighters (P-51s and P-47s). The usual format is that a mission is explained in general terms, and then repeated as remembered by one of the pilots. The size of the missions is simply amazing – as many as 1200 bombers escorted by 800 fighters. (I attended the National Air Races in Cleveland in 1929. There was a fly-over of 11 B-17s, which was every B-17 that the then U.S. Army Air Force had.)

At the start of WWII, an airman would be sent back to the States after 25 missions. This was increased to 30 missions, and later to 35. The pilots and crew were just kids, many enlisting right out of high school. One of them in the book was only 16. He must have lied about his age.

It was an exciting book to read, and I highly recommend it.
