Our chapter is experiencing phenomenal growth which is both a blessing and a



challenge. The blessing is obvious in that we have increased attendance at our monthly meetings and chapter events, and our membership growth brings a diversity of aviation interests and expectations. The challenge is that our "usual way of business" does not meet everyone's interests and expectations, and therefore, some members may feel like the chapter only partially serves their needs.

In our March Chapter Board / Business meeting we discussed this challenge at some length by asking ourselves: What steps can we take to expand our programs and activities to be more satisfying to our diverse membership?

It's a simple enough question, but not easy to answer in a sustainable way. Analyzing our diversity is the first step and it reveals that we have grown in the following areas: the number of millennial members, number of women, number of student pilots, the number of aircraft owners, the number of ultralight and light sport pilots, and the number of non-owners/non-pilots.

The good news here is that we expected the need for some of these groups and previously launched the Student & Rusty Pilots Committee to service students and occasional pilots. In addition, we changed our monthly meeting format to be more social and

informative and we have tried to rally the women in our chapter to form a group that serves their interest. This is all good, but it is not enough because we are not satisfying all our membership.

During further discussion at our meeting, we discussed the idea of developing "special interest" groups within our chapter. This idea resonated with the board members, so we looked further at tools we can use to help the growth of special interests within our chapter. Finally, would special interest groups serve everyone in the chapter and broaden our appeal to attract more membership?

We are currently investigating the use of online forums for our membership to use similar to the forums used by EAA and Vans Airforce to help their members with specific interests. We are in the early stages of investigation, but our hope is that we can use a forums program on our chapter website or Facebook page that allows you to define an interest area (e.g. weekend fly-outs, project building, women aviators, breakfast/lunch club, etc.) to build a group of likeminded interests and then announce activities or ask questions to the forum members. The beauty of forums is that it is membership driven and can evolve or dissolve as interests move on to other areas.

The ultimate goal of the Chapter Board is to serve the membership to the fullest extent possible. This is a "tall challenge" given our growth and diversity. To do so, it is imperative that you give us feedback on the things you like about our chapter as well as our shortcomings and ways to improve them. The Chapter Board can't do it by itself, and can't do it without you. Please share your ideas for improvement as we work to meet the needs of all chapter members.

Cory competes regularly in International Aerobatic Club (IAC) competitions. The IAC is the world's larg-



est aerobatic organization. The IAC's mission is to promote and enhance the safety and enjoyability of aerobatic flying.

Over the course of several years, Cory competed in the IAC Sportsman Aerobatics category placing very well among his competitors and winning 1st Place during the 2016 Nationals competition in Texas. In 2017, Cory advanced to competing in the Intermediate Category placing 4th in a very competitive field of contestants. Flying his Pitts S1C, Cory claimed the IAC's US National Championship in 2017.

Cory's topic will be "Learn about the International Aerobatic Club (IAC)." He will discuss how to get started in aerobatics. Chapter 93 Forum Now Operational!

Ladies and Gentlemen of Chapter 93 (and all other chapter members also)! The Chapter Forum(s) are now operational, that is, up and running! Please sign up at http://forum.eaa93.org/

For ease of navigating to the Chapter Forum you'll also find links to our Forum at the bottom of our website's front page (https://eaa93.org) and also under the "Media" tab drop-down menu at the very top of the first page and also at the top of most of the website's other pages.

For the time being our forum is open to anyone with an interest in local general aviation. Hopefully this won't be abused, otherwise we will limit to only Chapter 93 members. But so far anyone can join, so if you know non-chapter members interested in local aviation, please tell them about our forum, and for sure sign-up yourself.

Important note: You can set your "preferences" to let you know via email if someone posts so that you can go see, but you can also set your preferences so as not to get too many emails, or none at all so that you

see new messages only when you log on rather than getting emails.

What is a forum? Not all of our membership may be familiar with Internet forums (these are sometimes also called message boards). They are online discussion sites where people can hold conversations in the form of posted messages. It's like posting emails to a group, where everyone who joins can participate and read the emails and respond. Forums like Chapter 93's are hierarchical; they contain a number of sub-forums, each of which may have several or multiple topics. Within a forum's topic, each new discussion started is called a "thread" and can be replied to by as many people as might wish.

In our forums, to post messages participants will have to register with the forum and then log in, but you don't have to log in just to read existing messages.

An ex-Corsair jock adds his two dimes (2 cents adjusted for inflation)

You can easily prove to yourself that a downwind turn doesn't result in a higher stall speed. At 1500 feet or higher (so you're not influenced by the ground picture) and with at least a 15-knot wind blowing, do a minimum-speed 360-degree turn with about a 20-degree hank, maintaining level flight. Essentially, the plane drifts with the air mass, and it's entirely unaffected by the ground. As long as you maintain these steady-state conditions, you won't stall any quicker when turning downwind than upwind.

What does make a downwind turn dangerous is to try to follow an imaginary track on the ground, which you think should be your flight path, by either lightening up a turn when you're low and slow or by trying to force the turn by using more rudder. This results in a skid/uncoordinated turn, which in turn increases the stall speed. If you stall in a low-speed turn and the ball isn't centered, you'll get a more violent wingdrop stall that results in more altitude loss than from the straight-ahead stall you normally practice.

Fifty-five years ago we were taught in advanced training (and it was fun to practice) that to recover from a landing-approach turn stall in an F4U (Corsair), with its sudden wing-drop, recovery was quicker with less altitude loss by applying a lot of left stick and rudder and completing a roll all the way

around to wings level, then ease the nose back up. This recovery won't ever be needed in my Skyhawk or Pietenpol, but if you're flying a heavier plane, think about trying it sometime.

A friend of mine was killed last year following engine failure on takeoff, not because he turned downwind but because he didn't maintain airspeed in the low-altitude 180-degree turn he was trying to make. Do you really want to trust your life to the accuracy of a split-second decision you'd make for a gliding 180-degree turn considering loading, density altitude, rate of descent, a little skid, wind conditions, obstruction height, other traffic, the plane's stall characteristics, etc.?

Always, as you add power for takeoff, remind your-self that if the engine quits and you're low, you'll land straight ahead (or turn slightly into the wind). You can always fix the airplane, and a forced landing in a level altitude is almost always survivable,* so why take the risk of trying to turn back and stalling out of a low-speed, uncontrolled turn at low altitude? This risk is the same whether the wind is calm or blowing at 20 knots.

*Editor's Note 2018: "Off-field landings under control" have an under-appreciated low fatality rate, less than 5%.

A Brief History of EAA Chapter 93 1961-1995

THE EARLY DAYS (Part Two)

By early 1962, the chapter group felt it was time to officially elect officers. The February, 1962 report written by Dr. Larry Ketchum included the following announcement:

FORMAL ORGANIZATION OF Chapter #93 TO TAKE PLACE SUNDAY.

The time has come for the chapter to elect officers and to plan an effective program for the coming months. This formal organization step was postponed at our first meeting because none of us knew much about each other or the group. Now, after several meetings, all of which have been successful, we can get down to business and bring into being a successful permanent local unit of EAA. Please consider who you would like to ask to fill the various offices and be on hand Sunday to help get this organized. It has been suggested that the office of president be filled by an amateur aircraft builder - someone who has built or is building an aircraft. Dr. Ketchum will not be a candidate for the office of president.

The election was held February 25, 1962 in McFarland at the home of Herb and Elaine Szelesty, and the following officers were elected: President – Wally Watson, Vice-President – Stan Mockrud, Secretary-Treasurer – Ellery Schroeder, Program Chairman – Dr. Larry Ketchum, Auxiliary Representative – Elaine Szelesty.

The Chapter dues were set at \$3 per year.

The March, 1962 newsletter reported that Verdell Hallingsted, Chapter 93 member from Hillsboro, was the

subject of an article in the *Wisconsin State Journal* about his Pietenpol homebuilt. The March meeting was held on a Sunday at the DEC Aviation hangar, Truax Field. Wally Watson, chapter president, was the chief pilot for DEC (Dairy Equipment Co.).

Members traveled long distances to the meeting in the early days of the chapter. A fly-in/drive-in meeting was held at the Portage Airport on Sunday, September 16th, and a month later at the Lavon Hall residence in Lancaster. A note on the invitation stated:

"If you plan to fly in, land at Vesperman Flying Service strip, 3 miles south - a red Plymouth station wagon will be there - drive it."

Chapter members had been discussing the idea of a chapter building project, thinking it would be a good way for "timid souls hesitant about going it alone" to gain building experience and confidence.

By January, 1963, Chapter 93 had a building project, a new home, and new officers. The Ketchum's offered the use of their "country estate", the old East Pleasant Ridge School, near Dodgeville. The chapter building project would be a Volkswagen-powered Headwind, like one chapter members had seen at the Rockford fly-in. New chapter officers included Larry Ketchum - President; LaVon Hall - Vice President; Ray Osborn - Secretary; Don Deischer - Treasurer; Bob Hughes - Program Chairman; and Bob Hoyer, Project Chairman.

1963 Newsletters reflected unbounded enthusiasm. Members got together with chainsaws to cut firewood. They did electrical wiring and installed

fluorescent lights in the schoolhouse basement. Members gathered parts and materials for the Headwind. They organized knitting classes for the women and games for the kids. (There was no indication that the women were interested or encouraged to get involved in aircraft construction.) Sunday afternoon and evening meetings included pot-luck suppers.

Chapter member Ed Todd successfully flew his twoplace folding-wing monoplane for FAA inspectors at Truax Field (later Dane Co. Regional Airport) May 23, 1963. This was his third building project, the first two being Wittman Tailwinds.

Plans were in place for a Chapter 93 camping unit at the National Fly-In at Rockford.
